A relative pronoun introduces a dependent clause that modifies (gives more information about) a word, phrase, or idea in the independent clause.

The most common relative pronouns are:

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RELATIVE PRONOUNS

A relative pronoun agrees with its antecedent in the sentence. If the antecedent is singular, the relative pronoun is singular. If that antecedent is plural, the pronoun is plural. Usually, the meaning of the sentence shows you which word is the antecedent.

Bob is the *boy who has* received the promotion. (singular)

They are the *women who teach* at West School. (plural)

Libby is the only *one of the girls who plays* the piano. (singular)

The Morgans are the sort of *neighbors who are* interested in your welfare. (plural)
